January 27-28th – Angler's Choice Open House was held in Martinsville. This event was the first time this event has been held since COVID. Chapter members had a table set up and talked about TU's mission and our chapter with event attendees.

American Fisheries Society by Eric Tichay

The Virginia Chapter of the American Fisheries Society (AFS) recently hosted the AFS Southern Division's Annual Meeting, February 1st to the 5th at Norfolk, VA.

The event was attended by government and industry fisheries professionals, university professors and students, and aquatic resource c onservationists from 18 AFS chapters throughout the south from Texas to Maryland, including Puerto Rico. The Virginia Department of Wildlife Resources successfully administrated the event.

The event schedule was packed with 15 educational workshops, 21 symposium (technical sessions) and a Saturday morning plenary session. In addition, university students were invited to compete in the Best Student Poster contest. Students displayed technical posters depicting research projects throughout the event hallways.

Workshops were generally presented by experienced fisheries biologists, university professors, and industry professionals. Technical sessions were expertly presented by university students assisted by professors. The author attended workshops on Problematic Aquatic Plants and Aquatic Connectivity. The author also attended 10 technical session topics that included Brook Trout Genetic Data, Creel Surveys and Angler Attitude, Aquatic Connectivity, Climate Change, and Techniques, for example electrofishing.

The AFS Southern Division Annual Meeting is an ideal event to get quickly informed on current aquatic and fisheries conservation practices, and to meet fisheries biologist and other conservation professionals. I highly recommend joining AFS and attending the 2024 annual meeting in Chattanooga, Tennessee.

Pattern Originated By and Fly Tied By Al (Al Kittredge)

Smith River Allieworm

Hook: Dai-Riki #060, or similar Nymph hook.

Thread: Black.

Weight or Underbody: 3.20mm
Gold bead or .020 lead
wire. The bead is best but
try both.

Tail: Alaskan Roe Salmon Egg Yarn by Orvis.

Body: Black Orvis Ultra or Micro chenille, or similiar in small (fine) diameter.

Hackle: Black Saddle hackle
Palmered over the body.


Trout Unlimited Priority Waters Initiative

Over the past few years Trout Unlimited has been working on a project called Priority Waters. It's goal: Identify a national network of shared priority waters for native and wild trout and salmon, and take strategic actions to fix them.

Beginning in 2021 Seth Coffman, TU's Shenandoah Headwaters HRI in Virginia, began a working group in Virginia to identify a list of Virginia's priority waters. From January through February of 2021 group members set parameters to determine which rivers and stream systems to focus on. Some of the questions asked for each was were there native or wild trout populations? Was their interest among various partners to work together towards preservation and improvement of the system? Were there identifiable conservation opportunities and could TU provide added value towards achieving those goals? After taking these factors, and others, into account a list of three priority waters areas were identified.

- Grayson Highlands Priority Waters Area
- Upper James River/Upper Shenandoah River Priority Waters Area
- Blue Ridge Priority Waters Area




In the years ahead Seth will lead efforts in these three areas. SRTU plans to have Seth join us for our September chapter meeting where he will be able to provide a deeper dive into future plans for these areas of Virginia and can answer any questions you may have.
